Independence

If you look up the definition of "freedom" in the dictionary, it'll tell you about not being in slavery, about easiness and familiarity, and about the ability to have a choice. This week we'll be celebrating freedom that was fought for hundreds of years ago. Blood was shed for us to be able to worship, speak up, and live the way we want to without unreasonable restriction. And, of course, I'm sure we've all heard a preacher or two say that we get to celebrate freedom in Christ every day not just on Independence Day.

So now what? What do we do with that freedom? Is freedom in this country just about barbecues and fireworks? Is freedom in Christ just about going to church every Sunday and asking God to give us everything we want? We can be content to celebrate our freedoms in ways that make us comfortable. It's tempting to stay quiet and keep our heads down while we go about our lives, to buy into our label as a model minority.

But the deaths that ensured our freedoms probably want more from us. They didn't want us to isolate ourselves from the world we're in, building walls that are miles high. The disciples were disruptive. When Peter and John saw men exploiting a demon possessed girl for their own greed, they freed her and ended up in jail for it. Philip, Paul, and many others reached out to people from different backgrounds that were often rejected so that they could find salvation even when they faced criticism. John was tortured and still that didn't stop him from completing his life's purpose. Our ancestors did everything they could to overturn what existed to create a better future.

While we may not be facing the issues that the apostles faced, we do face others. Much like the disciples, we need to take power we do have to stand up for people of other ethnicities, religions, and socioeconomic backgrounds because even if we may not always agree with them, we cannot deny that they too are God's creation and we need to love them as such. Problems in healthcare, education, poverty, or whatever else it may be are issues that our country is facing today and ones we can take a stand on. Support local businesses, volunteer at hospitals and nursing homes, recycle to help stop global warming, stand up for people who are being harassed, vote on everything from the local school budget to the president of the country. Tell people around you about how much Christ loves them and then back it up with actions that reflect that. Christ gave us freedom, in Him and in this place we get to call home, so that we could engage with and change the world around us.

10. THERE'S NOT MUCH WE CAN DO...

This is, perhaps, one of the most dangerous myths out there. It's easy to blow off Christian persecution as something distant, unchangeable and too complex to change. However, there are so many things we can do—every day—to enter the battle and lift up our brothers and sisters who are suffering around the world for their faith. Prayer is our greatest weapon. It goes beyond strongholds, and into places we could never venture. And if you believe the book of Acts, prayer can break chains, release prisoners, bring aid and relief to suffering saints like no other resource. We can also volunteer to be an advocate and create awareness, write letters, sign petitions and lead prayer groups. And, of course, we can also give—to provide urgent relief and aid, Bibles, Christian literature, safe houses, counseling—and even resources to rebuild homes and churches.

I encourage you to take action. Ask God for His leading. And take one small step today to lift up persecuted believers all over the world.
